WHAT DOES E.A.S.T.E.R. STAND FOR?

Was the resurrection of Jesus fact or fiction? Something happened Easter Sunday 2000 years ago that changed the course of history and the hearts of man forever. Here are just some of the events that took place that support the belief in a Risen Christ.

<u>E is for empty tomb.</u> Where did the body go? People began preaching about <u>the resurrection</u> in the same city where people had seen him die. No one would have believed them if the body was still in the tomb. Even more, Jesus's enemies would have done anything to produce the body, but they couldn't. There are many theories that attack the empty tomb, but all of them can be refuted.

A is for appearances. Many people saw Jesus after his resurrection. They were either lying or all hallucinated. Both of these suggestions are highly unlikely.

S is for skeptics converted. Paul, Constantine, and Dr. Simon Greenleaf are just a few famous converts to Christianity.

T is for transformed apostles. From publicly denying Jesus to boldly preaching to thousands in Jerusalem, the disciples were changed forever. They preformed miracles in the name of Jesus and continued to preach about the resurrection until all but one were brutally killed for it.

E is for the existence of the church. No one can explain the existence of the millions of Christians without the resurrection. Christianity was a totally new and radical idea not influenced by anything other than the resurrection of Jesus.

R is for the rite of baptism. Before the resurrection this act was not used as a means of salvation or the forgiveness of sins. This is a totally new concept that did not begin until Jesus commanded it in Matthew 28:19-20, "Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age." Peter also gave the condition, "Peter said to them, "Repent, each of you and be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins; and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit."" Acts 2:38.

These facts are important because a belief in the resurrection is essential to the Christian faith. "But if there is no resurrection of the dead. not even Christ has been raised: and if Christ has not been raised. then our preaching is vain, your faith also is vain" 1 Corinthians 15:13-14.

Holy Week





Thursday in Holy Week, as most Lutheran service books call it, or Maundy Thursday, as it is known elsewhere in the Christian church, is the anniversary of the institution of the Lord's Supper. the name Maundy Thursday is derived from the foot-washing ceremony, performed in imitation of our Lord's action at supper and of His subsequent mandatum (new commandment), from which the word "Maundy" is coined.

In the Catholic Church, as part of the later communion service, a special host (bread) was blessed and consecrated for use on Good Friday as the Mass of the Presanctified. This host was then escorted in procession to a side altar known as the Altar of Repose. And following the communion service, the altars were stripped and washed in preparation for the austere services of Good Friday.

When Good Friday emerged as a separate day commemorative of the crucifixion and death of Jesu, it became at once the church's great day of mourning and therefore of fasting. Since then, in all lands and in all periods of Christian history, there has been agreement on the nature of Good Friday as on almost no other day in the calendar. In liturgical churches, the color of the day has been black.

The ancient title for the day was *Parasceve* (Preparation). The name Good Friday is of English origin and is possibly derived from "God's Friday" just as "good-bye" is derived from "God be with you."

BEHOLD THE MAN!

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things were made through Him, and without Him was not anything made that was made. . . . The Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we have seen His glory, the glory as of the only Son from the Father, full of grace and truth.

—John 1:1–3, 14

"Behold the man!" proclaimed the unwitting preacher Pontius Pilate in one of the shortest, yet most profound, sermons ever recorded. This will be our endeavor this Lententide and Easter Sunday. Behold the man, God in human flesh, Jesus. His incarnation will provide the basis for our meditation and proclamation on His Passion. And His real, bodily suffering and death will provide the basis for our full-throated proclamation on Easter morning of a bodily resurrection, not just of Jesus but also for His saints. Real bodies that have suffered, wept, bled, prayed, eaten, hoped, and more will be those raised incorruptible from their graves on the day of Jesus' return.

We will fix our eyes and our preaching on the man Jesus, contemplating the inescapable fact—indeed the most important fact in the course of human history—that God became man. The Second Person of the eternal, triune God, who we confess in the Nicene Creed as "God of God, Light of light, very God of very God . . . of one substance with the Father, by whom all things were made," became a living, breathing, flesh-and-blood human being, a man.

In some ways, you can understand that the first heresy the Christian Church had to contend with was that of Gnosticism, the hyperspiritual religion that held that because no man could be God, the Christ could not be God. Gnosticism is alluring because it tidies everything up, gives Christianity a more attractive, spiritual veneer, and pulls its adherents out of the mire of this world and gives them something other-worldly to strive for.


Considered correctly, it becomes pretty hard to spiritualize Christianity—a religion that bases its existence on the enfleshment, the incarnation, of her God—into the mess of disembodied, matter-rejecting, hyperspiritual Gnosticism. When God has flesh and blood, skin and teeth, cells and nuclei, DNA and RNA, it's difficult to contend for the disembodied spiritual against the material. If God has a body, bodies must matter.

In case you aren't convinced of the pervasiveness of the second-century heresy of Gnosticism, even in our twenty-first-century context, attend a funeral. If you hear talk only of heaven with nary a word of a bodily resurrection, you've witnessed firsthand modern-day Gnosticism. If the preacher doesn't deal with the body in the casket as the real person whose death has assembled the mass of grieving relatives and friends, if he talks only about the bodyless soul in heaven, he hasn't preached a genuinely Christian funeral. In other words, if he gives preference to the spiritual over the material, he succumbs to the Gnostic heresy the earliest generations of the Church sought to guard against by preaching the incarnation and resurrection of Jesus.

This Lent, we will consider what it means that God became man. In preparation for the celebration of a real, bodily, flesh-and-blood, bone-and-sinew resurrection, the resurrection without which our faith and our preaching are all in vain, consider the body of Jesus that exists in order to be nailed to a cross. The spiritual, bodyless Son of God became the embodied, enfleshed, incarnate Son of Mary. In Jesus, God has human flesh, a body, just like you. What could be more profound?

Each week, we'll consider a different aspect of the body of Jesus Christ. What does it mean that, in Jesus, God has hands, feet, lungs, lips, eyes, and ears?

Behold the man! In sermon, in study, in devotion, behold the man!



Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday, the victorious and triumphal entrance of Christ into Jerusalem. Zechariah 9:9 makes this prophesy, "Behold, your King is coming to you." The Church sees this prophecy fulfilled as Jesus enters Jerusalem on a donkey. These events precede the Last Supper in the upper room, Maundy Thursday (purple) and the institution of the Lord's Supper. Jesus gives His body and His blood as a means of forgiveness and salvation. The celebration of Good Friday (black) occurs and the culmination of the penitential season of Lent hits its crescendo. Easter Sunday (white) finishes off a six-week period of anticipation and preparation for the Christian in the resurrection of the Savior of the world.

STEWARDSHIP: APRIL 2019

"Blessed shall you be in the city, and blessed shall you be in the field. Blessed shall be the fruit of your womb and the fruit of your ground and the fruit of your cattle, the increase of your herds and the young of your flock. Blessed shall be your basket and your kneading bowl. Blessed shall you be when you come in, and blessed shall you be when you go out" (Deut 28:3-6).

This is God's promise to the Israelites as they stood beyond the Jordan outside of the Promised Land. He promises blessing to His people. He will make them prosper, whether they are in the city or the field. He will make their fruit of their work to prosper, whether from the ground or their wombs, their flocks or their herds. He will make them to prosper in all things, whether upon their coming in or their going out.

But there's a catch. He would do this for Israel only "if you obey the voice of the Lord your God" (Deut 28:2b). If they did that, He would cause that "all these blessings shall come upon you and overtake you" (Deut 28:2a).

If they didn't obey the voice of the Lord, if they didn't keep the commandments of the Lord and walk in His ways (Deut 28:9), they would be met with curse and woe. The blessings would be replaced with curses. Everything that the Lord promised to prosper and bless would be cursed and fail.


Thanks be to God that our Lord Jesus Christ has come into our flesh, fulfilled the law for us – in in our place and for our benefit; died for us – in our place and for our benefit.

By this we have justification before God. We are forgiven, clean, holy, and righteous. The blessing of God is promised to us in Christ Jesus. It depends upon His work and not ours.

All this is ours in Holy Baptism. For in Holy Baptism, God claims us as His own, makes us His children, His heirs, His holy people. And so it is that the work of our hands and its fruit is holy because we are holy in Christ. It is pressed into His service, and thereby it becomes a blessing to us and to our neighbor.

For this great gift, our reception of the blessings of God because of Christ Jesus our Lord, it is our duty to thank and praise, serve and obey Him. This is not in order to receive blessings but because in Christ we already have.

It is with this in mind that we sit down on the first day of the week and set aside as He has prospered us to give to His church for His work of blessing in our midst (1 Cor. 16:2).


